Remembering over and over again how He is true to His word, how He made a way, how He stayed with us. We can see promises of His faithfulness in 2 Timothy 2:13, that He remains with us always and never leaving or forsaking us, Isaiah 43.



As the ministry is faced with the ongoing needs of caring for the kids in the orphanage, providing financial grants to families, supporting the foster/adoptive community with resources, making connections with churches to rise up for the orphan, interceding for many spiritual battles, seeking financial partners who will help us as we fall short with the monthly budget, there is much. As we look ahead, there is always more "and" another need and it can feel like we simply we fall short. Meeting these needs in our own strength is impossible and overwhelming, but choosing to continue to see He is able to do immeasurably more than

we can ask or imagine as He promises in Ephesians 3. Not Jesus and something else....just Him. He is helper, defender, provider, redeemer, and Savior. As we recently prayed with one of our staff members in Haiti, who was seeking peace and healing, we asked that very same question, have you chosen and accepted Jesus as your Lord and Savior? Not Jesus and voodoo, not Jesus and something else, but choosing Him above other things and acknowledging He is the only one.

Each month, as we interview families for a grant, we ask the question, "what is your greatest desire for your children?" The greatest desire that we have as a ministry, for the precious ones in our care, as parents, is that our children will have a personal relationship with Jesus, that they will know Him and love Him, and know the love of Him. All of the other things dim in light of this. If we know this, if we think about this, if we remember this, then all of the other "and's" that we think we need to do, will be put in perspective and all of the ways we don't see measuring up will fade away as well.

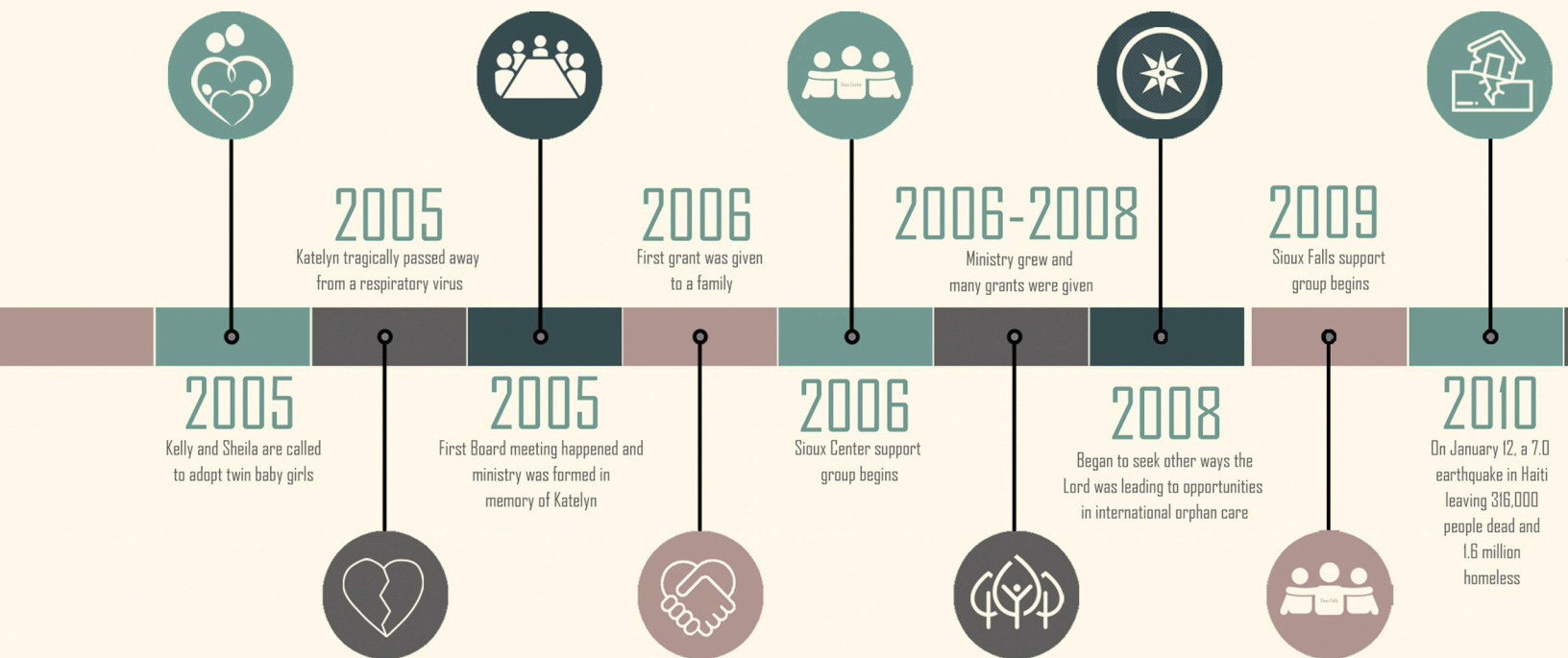
Orphan care is hard, it doesn't go away, there is always a need, day after day. Parenting is hard. Parenting kids from hard places, navigating through trauma, is exceptionally hard. Feeling like needs are beyond what we can handle or meet, could be debilitating. A look into the faithfulness of



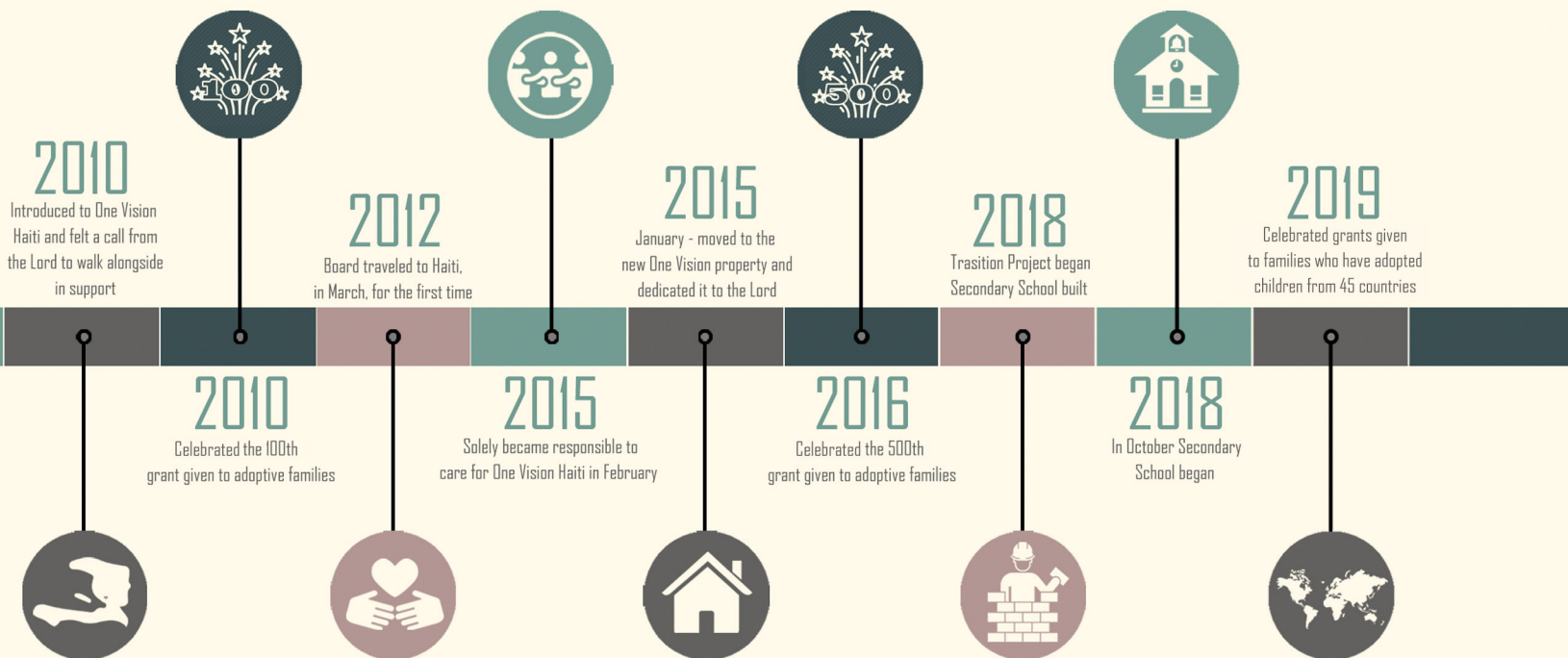

Eighteen years ago, in Seoul, South Korea, I chose to walk through the doors of an orphan baby shelter to see if they could use a volunteer. I expected to be asked to feed or bath babies, or change diapers. As it turned out, they simply wanted me to hold crying babies; and I remember how babies were pacified simply by being held. Love was their greatest need. That experience has made my life forever different, and, though I've aged, adoption remained in my plans. More than ten years ago, my husband Andrew also was gaining a heart for adoption – as the result of pro-life concerns and volunteering for Compassion International. Later Andrew served as an SIM missionary in Nigeria, where he worked with orphans and street children, and consequently future hopes to adopt only intensified in significance to him.

These are our life experiences, but at heart we have been forever changed by the way God in grace accepts us, through His Son Jesus Christ, as a real act of “adoption”. We have wanted to do likewise, by accepting a child as our own through adoption.

After having two biological children (Joanna & Simon), we were reaching the right age and stage to adopt. Nevertheless, it was difficult for us to take the first step. We worried about financial burdens and uncertainties about the child. However, the Holy Spirit led us to walk by faith, facing our fear for love of the child – and we have surely experienced God walking with us, providing for our needs, and preparing our hearts. Since January 2019, we've been matched with a precious little boy! He is 16 months old now and we're giving him the name Matthias Joosung. His Korean name means “Victory of the Lord.” Hyejin came from South Korea at 29 years old, so Korean language and culture is very much a part of our family. We hope this will help Matthias with transition and in future identity struggles.

In March, in the midst of waiting for our son, we had an interview with Katelyn's Fund board members. The interview and focus on prayer felt to us like adoption and spiritual counselling! It was such an encouragement to us, and one of the best experiences in our adoption process! Katelyn's fund has since provided a grant for our adoption, which has just been further testimony of their own love – and of God's faithfulness to provide for adoption. Thank you so much for your hearts, and efforts in adoption! We now joyfully and anxiously anticipate the day when we will bring our son home!

Born Out Of Brokenness

How long, oh Lord?

How long will you forget me? How long will you hide your face from me? How long must I wrestle? How long will my enemy triumph over me? (Psalm 13:1-2)

How long, oh Lord? How. Long.

Do you know we have been given permission to ask this question? Permission to wrestle and to doubt? Permission to weep and to wonder? Permission to not be okay - both within ourselves and with the way things are? We have. We've been given permission to be human.

The Psalms are full of raw poetry - more raw and blunt than many of us will ever have the courage to be. But when we can find ourselves in these lines that David wrote, when we can pray them back and sing them out, we join with generations of Jesus's beloved ones who have both felt unseen and been reminded that He has not forgotten them; that what we feel isn't always real, and that God's promises are truer than our perceptions.

Still, I've been asking that question of the Lord often when I think about Haiti these days.

Maybe some of you have been, too. With the ongoing riots and brokenness, disheartening news about Haiti continues to swirl, and in our humanness we start to wonder, "How long, oh Lord, is this going to continue? How long will they fight before they find peace? How long will the argue before they rebuild? What will it take? And how did they end up so far gone?"

I know there's a tinge of first-world perspective coating each of those questions, but it doesn't stop me from wondering.

Yet, the more I learn, the more I understand. Haiti was born out of brokenness. It was built on broken ground - placed on a cracked foundation, structured with broken beams, and covered with a leaky roof.

Haiti is a nation familiar with adversity - adversity with its roots in history before it was a nation at all. Haiti was founded by black people - ripped from their country and sold into oppression - who won freedom from slavery by force of arms, then was ostracized by world powers that resented its very existence. As the only Western nation to ever emerge from a successful slave rebellion, Haiti's history and survival is actually quite remarkable.

Before any of this ever took place, the island of Hispaniola, shared by modern day Haiti and the Dominican Republic, was once the richest colony of the New World. At the height of its prosperity, colonial power France brought in some 800,000 enslaved Africans from what is now Senegal, Guinea and Sierra Leone. Slaves provided the muscle for the economy and saw nothing in return.

After many years of forced labor, a former slave, Toussaint Louverture, became a leader in the Haitian Revolution, which began with a slave rebellion in 1791 and ended with the nation's independence in 1804. The revolution influenced events across the Americas, and Western policies have been punishing Haiti for winning its independence ever since.

After its independence, Haiti was a fledgling country trying to find its place in a hemisphere dominated by slavery. This is the part that really blows my mind. In 1825, Haiti started to pay France reparations — the equivalent today of \$21 billion — to compensate the French slaveholders it had fought to overthrow. You didn't miss that, did you?

Haiti had to pay France because they were no longer going to work for as dehumanized slaves for free. Before retreating, the French violated the land, stripping the nation of anything of value - starting with a mass deforestation that has left much of the country eroded away and unusable for crop.



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Adoption & Foster Care Support

Katelyn's Fund adoption and foster support group is a lifeline to so many, especially me.

The first time I attended the Katelyn's Fund adoption and foster support group a few years ago, we were in the process of bringing home our daughter. When we went around the circle for introductions, my introduction included me saying, "...and our six-year-old daughter comes home to live with us tomorrow!" I can't really remember what was running through my mind at that moment, though I remember the group was excited with some audible "oohs and aahs." Mainly I remember a few ladies catching me after the session and offering to pray with me. That was a good initiation into the group.

We live across the midwest from the rest of our family, and though they are very supportive, they can't exactly stop over for babysitting or to drop off a meal. And most people we know in town can't fathom what goes on in our home as we've welcomed our daughter into our family. Our daughter has been through a lot of early childhood trauma and came to us from an institutional setting. Needless to say, we have had an intense transition these last few years. There have been many days that I've thought that we were alone and no one would believe what kind of struggles our family was having all day, most days. Life as a foster and adoptive parent can be isolating. I needed a lifeline.

Thankfully I found the other adoptive and foster parents who are in the same boat, who understand, and who can lend support just by knowing the realities of adopting and fostering. I also have found great training on effective trust-based relational parenting. Each monthly meeting, I feel renewed and encouraged to keep trusting God and press on. Katelyn's Fund adoption and foster support group is a unique group that is not typical in most locations. When I needed to find some local family-like support, I found it at Katelyn's Fund adoption and foster support group. And it is a lifeline for me.

Born Out Of Brokenness

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The United States was not innocent in the aftermath. Fearing slaves in the South would get ideas about staging their own revolution, the US refused to trade with Haiti and didn't recognize its independence until 1862. U.S. troops invaded Haiti in 1915 and didn't leave until 1934.

Despite government corruption and acute poverty, Haitians are among the world's most resilient people, and I think all of this is important to keep in mind, not only as we watch the news but also as we pray for our family at OneVision.

There is so much more history than we've cared to see, so much more oppression than we've begun to understand; yet there is also so much more strength that has yet to be uncovered and so many more dreams of the Lord yet to be released.

Jesus has not forgotten Haiti. His eyes were not closed when they were ripped from their homes, whipped to obedience, nor chained even in freedom. His justice will roll like a mighty river, His righteousness like a never-failing stream (Amos 5:24). He will turn His face and answer them (Psalm 13:3).

But until then, I believe He says, "Join your voice with theirs. Cry out as if you cry with a very best friend..."

How long, oh Lord. How long?
